ORAL SOURCES

ANTH 470; ANTH/NORS 670

Fall 2011 – Thursday 6-9 pm

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The aims of this course are to examine the meaning and multiple uses of oral communication, especially for research in anthropology, history and folklore. This course looks at the production and reception side of oral sources, their meaning in context and their uses as data. Students will be introduced to methods for recording, processing, analyzing and organizing oral data from performances, interviews and orally organized events. Most of the course will consist of discussions and writing assignments dealing with the peculiarities and characteristics of the oral world and the ways in which oral sources are used in research. Students will be expected to discuss the required reading for each class period in light of examples from their own experience, oral recordings or other readings. In some cases, discussion questions will be handed out or posted on ERes a week in advance.

Course Goals:

- To better understand the nature of oral communication, especially as it relates more generally to culture and history
- To better appreciate the nature and importance of stories
- To learn how to use and contribute to the University of Alaska Oral History Collection and Project Jukebox
- To learn about the ethical and legal requirements of research with oral sources
